

A Labor of Love Is Realized on a Wall

Downtown Putnam's bourgeoning outdoor public art venue just got a whole lot bigger with the completion of The Boxcar Mural. Stretching almost 300 feet along South Main Street, the mural begins near the rail crossing parking lot, continues along the sidewalk below the Boxcar Museum, and ends just before the underpass at Front Street. There will be a formal ribbon cutting and dedication on December 4 at 4:40 PM.

Pictured on the mural are the covers of the 19 Boxcar Children books written by Putnam author Gertrude Chandler Warner, as well as additional covers of later books in the series written by other authors in the style of Warner.

According to project director and lead artist Elaine Turner the mural was a real community project involving many individuals from toddlers to 80 year olds. Students offering their artistic talents represented Putnam, Woodstock, Thompson, Pomfret, Killingly and Brooklyn, public and private schools.

Money for the project came from fund-raising. Sponsors for a -Continued on page 3-


Book Talk - And A Best Seller

The Aspinock Historical Society is please to announce the release of its latest book, "Manhasset Village, Gone But Not Forgotten." Researched and written by society members Fabiola Cutler and Sandra Ames, the book chronicles the stories of more than 100 families whose lives were forever impacted by the catastrophic 1955 flood which swept through the Manhasset Village section of Putnam.

The book details the residents, streets and businesses of a once thriving neighborhood which suddenly ceased to exist. Following the flood all of the houses and small businesses were demolished. The book includes many family histories, along with numerous photographs.

This must-read book became an instant best seller with the first printing sold out by mid-November. A second printing is in the works. The book retails for \$30.00 plus tax and is available at the Aspinock Historical Society Museum at 200 Providence Street, Putnam.

"Manhasset Village, Gone But Not Forgotten" is a testament to the strength of a community in the face of adversity.

BOXCAR STATS 2023

This past year, from May to mid-October, 1,061 people visited the museum, making the grand total of 9,887 people visiting the museum since it opened in 2004.

11 new Connecticut towns sent people to the museum, making a total of 151 of 169 towns in our state.

Three new states were added, for a total of 47 state visitors, leaving only Idaho, New Mexico and North Dakota to send visitors.


During the May to October 2023 season we had visitors from 29 states and the District of Columbia.

The total of visitors from four Canadian Provinces remains the same.

Seven new countries joined the previous count for a total of 37 world countries and territories. This year we welcomed international visitors from Lithuania, Mexico, Albania, Finland, Germany, Kenya and South Africa.

Another book of local interest is a memoir, "Remembering John Noel Dempsey: A Man Who Did Good," written by his son Father Ed Dempsey.

Born in Ireland in 1915, Dempsey and his family moved to Putnam, CT in 1925. He worked in the textile mills and later began a political career, which took him through six terms as Putnam's mayor, state representative, lieutenant governor and ultimately governor of Connecticut. His hands-on work following the flood of 1955 and redevelopment is legendary.

Just to paraphrase from the publisher's release of the book, "At a time when so many Americans are cynical and disgusted about the entire political process...it may come as a comfort to read about a politician who has been dubbed the genuine article...a man who believed that life was about giving and not about getting."

The book is available in paperback at M's Boutique in Putnam and Pourings and Passages Bookstore in Danielson.



The Aspinock Historical Society will be open to visitors beforehand.


In Other News







COLLECTOR'S CORNER

Old Recipes

In the Summer Newsletter we asked readers for recipes reaching back generations, even to colonial times. We received only one reply, and this one hits close to home. It is from my sister, Deborah Guido, who resides in Florida and New Jersey. Debbie has a notebook with handwritten recipes by our grandmother, Anna Evans, (Mercier). Nana was born in Quebec, Canada, and emigrated to the United States in the early 1900s, eventually settling in Putnam and raising a family. Her recipes for several kinds of wine pictured here were probably written a century ago.

While these recipes do not date to colonial days, they use simple ingredients and are interesting to read.
