The Sheep Project

The Samuel Slater Museum in Webster, MA is placing sheep figures (similar to the popular calf figures some years ago) in surrounding towns. Putnam has chosen to be part of this project and has purchased one of the sheep. The Arts Council and the Aspinock Historical Society are working together to create our sheep. It will have representations on each side that reflect Putnam's part in the Industrial Revolution and especially the wool industry. Samuel Slater's brother-in-law was Smith Wilkinson, so we have a great connection to the beginning of the Industrial Revolution and he had a mill in Putnam. The Cady-Copp Cottage Update

We are in the process of getting bids to complete the interior work at the cottage, located just off Liberty Highway on Putnam Heights. On an exciting note we just received a three volume inventory of the artifacts recovered during the 2005 dig by the Public Archeology Survey Team based in Storrs, CT. This group conducted a dig along the side the Cady-Copp cottage and uncovered thousands of "artifacts", everything from pins, nails, pipe stems, to pieces of broken pottery and glass, and much more. These artifacts are currently housed in 13 archival proof cartons at the Aspinock Historical Society Research Center.

We Have Published A Recent Book

"A Stroll Thru Putnam" depicting the old and present blocks and streets in Putnam is available at \$35 per book. We are working on another book **"Gone But Not Forgotten"** about Manohasset Village which was washed away in 1955 flood. The authors are Sandra Ames and Fab Cutler.
