Medal of Honor Recipient Henry Breault Remembered on Award Anniversary





On Saturday, March 9, members of the Aspinock Historical Society and the public attended a special talk on Putnam native Henry Breault at the Putnam Municipal Complex. The talk was presented by Ryan C. Walker, a Navy veteran and PhD candidate at the University of Portsmouth, UK (Above left).

Henry Breault was in service with the United States Navy in the Panama Canal Zone aboard the submarine USS O-5. On October 28, 1923, the O-5 collided with the United Fruit Company freighter "Abangarez," became disabled and sank.

In the process of abandoning ship Breault realized one of his shipmates, Lawrence T. Brown, was left behind in the torpedo room. Breault went back to get Brown and then closed the hatch to prevent further flooding as the sub sank in 40 feet of water. The two remained in the sealed off torpedo room for 31 hours before finally being rescued.

Breault was awarded the Medal of Honor for his selfless act of heroism in saving Brown's life by President Calvin Coolidge on March 8, 1924 (Above right). Breault continued to serve in the Navy until his death in 1941. He is buried in St. Mary's cemetery, Putnam, CT. The Aspinock program marked the 100th anniversary of the Medal of Honor award ceremony.

Remembering John Noel Dempsey

On December 9, 2023, Father Edward Dempsey gave a talk on his recent book, "Remembering John Noel Dempsey: A Man Who Did Good," at the Putnam Public Library. Father Dempsey is the son of former Putnam mayor and later governor of Connecticut John Dempsey. The Aspinock Historical hosted an open house in conjunction with author's talk.

Born in Ireland in 1915, Dempsey and his family moved to Putnam, CT in 1925. He worked in the textile mills and later began a political career, which took him through six terms as Putnam's mayor, state representative, lieutenant governor and ultimately governor of Connecticut. His hands-on work following the flood of 1955 and redevelopment is legendary.

Just to paraphrase from the publisher's release of the book, "At a time when so many Americans are cynical and disgusted about the entire political process...it may come as a comfort to some and dubious to others to read about a politician who personified the adage what you see is what you get," a person who believed that life was about giving and not about getting."

Dempsey spoke of his father, "That's the kind of man I grew up knowing, the kind of politician who would no longer fit the current mold, the person I am honored to call my father."

The full page spread above is from the December 18, 1925, issue. The ads are almost exclusively of an automotive nature, even though car ownership was not all that widespread at that time. Imagine putting non-skid chains, automatic windshield wipers or a new five tube Radiodyne on your Christmas list.

The two ads on the right are from 1946. World War II is over and America was looking forward to more leisure time activities, including skiing. How about a stylish ski suit or ski jacket for her at Kay's Clothes Shop.

Need some last minute food items to round out the Christmas dinner? Pop corn, mixed nuts, pineapple juice, and the ever-popular fruit cake were on sale at the Red & White Store. Does anyone remember where that store was located?

Above it is a WW I certificate awarded to a veteran who was wounded in action, signed by President Woodrow Wilson.



The large plaque pictured on page 1 once hung in the Israel Putnam Room of the former Berris Motor Inn on Route 6 in Brooklyn, CT. It is, of course, a likeness of Putnam namesake and Revolutionary War patriot General Israel Putnam.
